Mr. John Sutko

John Sutko, director emeritus of St. Peter and St. Paul Orthodox Church, Burr Ridge, IL, fell asleep in the Lord on Tuesday, June 09, 2020 after battling various health complications.

Born on March 28, 1935, he grew up on the South Side of Chicago, IL. John began singing in the St. Peter and St. Paul Choir at the age of 14 and at the age of 17 began to study music at Wilson Junior College. In 1953, at the age of 18, Archpriest Nicholas Semkoff asked him to direct the second Liturgy on Sundays, which was in Church Slavonic. He also encouraged John to concentrate on church music in addition to his other studies at the college.

While directing the choir at St. Peter and St. Paul, John began his studies in music at the Chicago Conservatory of Music as well as courses in education at Chicago Teacher College. In addition to traditional music courses, John was involved in oratorio, opera workshop, voice recitals, and solo work at various churches and other occasions in the Chicago area.

At the age of 20, John took over the directing of both liturgies at St. Peter and St. Paul.

In 1957, John received his Bachelor's in Music Education and on August 11, he married Alice Theresa Gabrysiak. During the same year, in addition to his position at St. Peter and St. Paul, John began his teaching career in music at McClure Junior High School in Western Springs, IL. He held that position for 35 years. In 1961 John received his master's degree in Music Education. In 1968 John became assistant principal at the junior high school and began work on his second master's degree in school administration. During his tenure in teaching, he was twice nominated for the Golden Apple Award in teaching in the state of Illinois.

In the late 1960's and early 1970's, the official English texts for all the feast day vespers and liturgies were being prepared by the Liturgical Commission of the Orthodox Church in America. John began to adapt all the vespers verses (stikhera, litiya, apostika) for the feast days of the Church in four parts and in their proper tones. This project took over ten years to complete. During the 1980's and 1990's, John continued to present the music of the Faith to other groups, churches, and organizations. He was the director for the consecration of Bishop Boris, the 1988 services commemoration the Millennium of Orthodoxy in Russia, the installation of Bishop Job, three patriarchal visits in the 1990's including Patriarch Aleksy II, Patriarch Pavle, and Patriarch Dimitrios, a benefit concert for Christ the Savior Cathedral in Moscow, the wedding of Prince Arnold and Princess Renate of Windisch-Graetz, Germany, and others.

In 1999, John began converting handwritten scores into computer formatting. The fruits of his labors produced a Panikhida service book, a book of Christmas carols of Eastern Europe, a children's choir book, and a Prostopinije of the Carpatho-Russian people.

John has also accepted invitations to participate in various professional choirs as the lead soloist, chanter, and oktavist. This includes the Bach Society of St. Louis, Missouri in their presentation of Rachmaninov's Divine Liturgy, Northwestern University, and the University of Chicago choirs during their presentations of Rachmaninov, Gretchaninov, and Kalinnikov vigils.

In 2013, a banquet was held in honor of John's 60 anniversary as choir director at St. Peter and St. Paul. This momentous event was recognized by the Synod of the Orthodox Church in America with a Synodal Gromata.

In February of 2016, John directed his last Divine Liturgy as the Choir Director of St. Peter and St. Paul Church. On May 6, 2017, the Order of St. Romanos was bestowed on him by the Holy Synod of the Orthodox Church in America.

John is survived by his wife Alice of 63 years, he is the loving father to David (Michele) Sutko and Cynthia (Gregory) Koranda; and grandfather of Priest Alexander (Carly) Koranda, Marissa (Ethan) Rucker, Aaron Koranda and Michael Sutko. He is the loving great-grandfather of Magdalena and Anna Koranda. He was the dear brother of Michael Sutko and Mary-Jane Rozdilsky.

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Statement by the Chancellor and the General Counsel of the Orthodox Church in America

With the blessing of His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon, the Chancellor, Archpriest Alexander Rentel, and the General Counsel to the Orthodox Church in America, Judge E.R. Lanier, made the following statement:

While it is not the practice of the Office of the Chancellor to comment on every rumor or baseless charge published on the internet that cause scandal and aggrieve the faithful of the Orthodox Church in America, we have seen fit to make this comment now. The situation in society and the Church has improved because of the steps that were taken in response to the present pandemic, and so it seems fitting to take a moment a reflect on what has transpired in and for our Church. We offer this statement in order to testify to the faithful of the Orthodox Church in America that our Church has faced well the challenges posed by novel SARS CoV-2 and COVID-19 in a hierarchical and conciliar manner. The Church acted, in other words, in a manner totally and completely consistent with its high calling.

From the beginning of this pandemic, His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon and the Holy Synod of Bishops have met regularly to formulate policy and draft accompanying pastoral messages of encouragement to the faithful. Their work has drawn on and was informed by the immense talent found within our Church. Pastors, theologians, medical doctors, healthcare workers, lawyers, and insurance professionals meeting in small groups, or together, or even with the Holy Synod have, in fact, assisted the Holy Synod in their work. Out of love for their beloved children in the Lord, in consultation with experts who are faithful members of our Church, the Holy Synod reasonably decided to comply with the directions of the Center for Disease Control and Prevention of the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services, as well as the further guidance and orders provided by different levels of civil government in the United States, Mexico, and Canada.

An informed decision to comply with civil directives was also made by the Metropolitan Council, which has also met during this pandemic under the presidency of His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon. In fact, the Holy Synod and the Metropolitan Council issued a joint statement regarding the response of the Orthodox Church in America to the coronavirus.

The diocesan bishops each took steps to engage different constituencies within their dioceses – diocesan councils, clergy meetings, parish councils – in order to carefully navigate the challenges posed by this virus. His Eminence Archbishop Mark and the Diocese of Eastern Pennsylvania even created a survey and called for all members of this diocese to reflect and respond to it. The results of this survey help guide His Eminence and his diocesan response.

Additionally, the steps that our Church has taken have been in accord with the Catholic nature of the Church. His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon has consulted with the heads of other, local Orthodox Churches where he has had the chance to discuss the precautionary measures these Churches have taken to prevent the spread of the virus. His Beatitude has also regularly joined meetings of the Executive Committee of the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America, where similar discussions have been held.

Almost simultaneously to the day when state governments began to issue their first regulations designed to thwart the spread of the coronavirus throughout the United States, lawyers from the Orthodox Church in America contributed to the work of an ad hoc Task Force of the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops. This pan-Orthodox Task Force, headed by His Eminence Metropolitan Gregory of Nyssa and composed of lawyers from different Orthodox jurisdictions in the United States, took immediate action to establish and serve as a source of information and as an immediate counterweight to regulatory provisions which even remotely touch upon any aspect of the beliefs and practices of our Orthodox Faith. Consisting largely of experts in the fields of public health and legal affairs, that Task Force has labored long and hard to track the evolution of state regulatory measures where these bear on Orthodox praxis even tangentially.

Although the labors of the Task Force have largely been at the level of almost mind-boggling detail and backbreaking minutia, at least two fundamental lessons learned by the members **Con't Next Page**

of the Task Force in their contact with state authorities have made themselves apparent: (1) the regulatory environment established by the states is kaleidoscopic in nature and changes on an almost daily, sometimes hourly, basis, a fact which mandates constant, unceasing surveillance and monitoring; and (2) state administrative regulators are well-intentioned and hard-working civil servants burdened with an almost insurmountable task, but who are largely unfamiliar with the tenets and practices of the Orthodox Faith. The ongoing interactions of the Task Force with these state-level regulators has most often taken on the hue of an educational exercise.

Laboring in informal tandem with a significant number of other organizations and individuals committed to the protection and preservation of American constitutional religious liberties, the Task Force has recently witnessed substantial progress in relations with state officials charged with the onerous task ensuring the health, safety, and welfare of the American public. These advances have been real. A state along the East Coast, to take an example, originally stipulated in its administrative regulations that Holy Communion "administered person-to-person" ... "is not permitted at this time." That state has revoked this objectionable language which has now been replaced by a provision allowing "person-toperson" administration of the Holy Sacrament, requiring now only that the clergy must use hand sanitizers only when "he or she believes incidental [physical] contact has been made with the communicant." States which had initially stipulated a onehour limitation on religious services have now deleted that obnoxious and unnecessary restriction. In other instances, states have backed off of other religious restrictions and have reduced these to voluntary, hortatory recommendations. The Task Force is confident that, with the abatement of the current pandemic, all such regulatory provisions in each of the states will be abandoned and that state intervention in the religious life of all American faith communities will become nothing more than a footnote in history.

The History of Father's Day

The idea for creating a day for children to honor their fathers began in Spokane, Washington. A woman by the name of Sonora Smart Dodd thought of the idea for Father's Day while listening to a Mother's Day sermon in 1909.

Having been raised by her father, William Jackson Smart, after her mother died, Sonora wanted her father to know how special he was to her. It was her father that made all the parental sacrifices and was, in the eyes of his daughter, a courageous, selfless, and loving man. Sonora's father was born in June, so she chose to hold the first Father's Day celebration in Spokane, Washington on the 19th of June, 1910.

In 1926, a National Father's Day Committee was formed in New York City. Father's Day was recognized by a Joint Resolution of Congress in 1956. In 1972, President Richard Nixon established a permanent national observance of Father's Day to be held on the third Sunday of June. So Father's Day was born in memory and gratitude by a daughter who thought that her father and all good fathers should be honored with a special day just like we honor our mothers on Mother's Day.

Greetings of His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon to His All-Holiness Patriarch Bartholomew for Feast Day of the Apostle Bartholomew

His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon congratulated His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew on the Feast Day of the Holy Apostle Bartholomew. Your All-Holiness, Beloved Brother and Concelebrant in the Lord's Mysteries,

In the joy of the Holy Spirit, I greet Your All-Holiness on this Feast of the Holy Apostle Bartholomew, your Name Day. May you always continue to receive guidance, encouragement and strength from the Holy Apostle, so that your wise leadership in the Holy Orthodox Church may continue for many years!

Celebrating the feast of Pentecost this week, we hear in the hymns of the day that the Holy Spirit "leads priests to perfection... teaches unschooled people wisdom... [and] reveals fisherman as theologians" (3rd Sticheron at "Lord I Have Cried"). The Apostle Bartholomew began his life as an unschooled person, but then became a student of the one true teacher, Christ. After learning and seeing many things from our Lord and beholding His Ascension, Bartholomew came to full understanding of these things when he was gathered together "in one place" with the others and received the Holy Spirit as a tongue of fire (Acts 2:1).

From him and the other Apostles, we their successors, as unschooled or imperfect as we may be, are brought to perfection through this same Spirit. Your All-Holiness, just as we look to the example of the Apostle Bartholomew, we have always looked to your example, as the leading hierarch of our Apostolic Church. Like your namesake, through discipline and diligence you have acquired the Spirit, as evidenced by your showing the fruit of the Spirit: "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control" (Galatians 5:22-23). You have personally shown love and kindness to the Orthodox Church in America on multiple occasions, and your Apostolic ministry of reaching out to the downtrodden of the world reveals your goodness and gentleness. May your labors continue in such spiritual gifts, and may you always grow in these gifts more and more!

Your All-Holiness, as you well know, we find ourselves in extremely difficult times. The Coronavirus pandemic has wrought disaster throughout the world. racism and violence have reared their ugly heads anew in the United States, and painful divisions persist among Christians and other peoples everywhere. Through your leadership, Your All-Holiness, may we labor together to heal the wounds of the world, which has descended again into vainglory and ungodliness, by bringing it to Christ.
