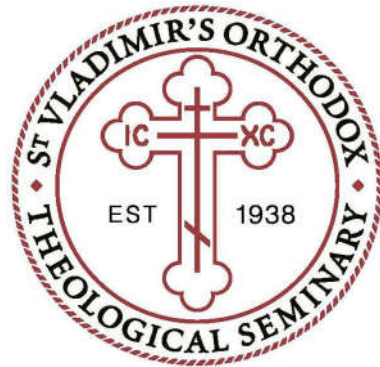

The Still Small Voice of God

Reflection By His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon

My Beloved Brethren and Blessed Children in the Lord,

Christ is in our midst!

It seems fitting today to say a few words about the Prophet Elijah and the still small voice of God in our lives.

The Prophet Elijah, whose memory we celebrate today, lived in tumultuous times. The people of Israel had rejected God and turned to idols, and their reigning government violently persecuted the Holy Prophet. Fleeing to the desert to seek refuge, the Lord asked him, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" Elijah responded: "I have been very jealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the people of Israel have forsaken thy covenant, thrown down thy altars, and slain thy prophets with the sword; and I, even I only, am left; and they seek my life, to take it away." In response, the Lord commanded Elijah to stand on the mountain before Him. After showing the prophet a great wind, a mighty earthquake, and fire, God finally spoke to Elijah in "a still, small voice."

Through this account, the example is given to us of how we, as the Body of Christ, should reveal God to the world through our words. When we perceive that our society has reverted from Christianity to idolatry, and when we sense that some levels of government in our society are treating Christians unfairly, our task as the Church is not to manifest God through tempestuous outrage, earth-quaking tirades, or emotionally-fired speech. Neither, as Elijah was tempted to do, should we give in to self-pitying or defeatism. Rather, as the Church it is our task to manifest God's presence through a still, small voice.

God's still small voice is not condescending, it is not insulting, it does not seek to harm. It is not profane, rude, or violent.

Rather, God's still small voice is still, because it is balanced and considerate. It is small, because it is

humble and often rejected. But it is nevertheless a voice! And indeed, when we have words to say that glorify God and manifest Truth to the world, then indeed, we should open our mouth, and the Spirit will inspire us to be the heralds of God's love.

Engaging with one another by remote and online means more than ever in these months, in the midst of forceful and loud storms in society, let us first allow the Lord to speak to us in a still small voice, through engaging with Him in prayer, silence, and contemplation. Then, let us allow Him to speak through us, through whatever physical or media means we are using, to be the vehicles of His still small voice. Through the use of kind words, through the use of considerate speech, through the use of reason - logos - rather than emotion, we fulfill our role as Christ's Church to be God's voice.

The Church will always be "small" in the world's eyes; appearing foolish or irrelevant. Yet we know the truth hidden to the world: Our Church's authentic voice is the most rational and true voice in the world. This paradox exists because our wisdom does not belong to the world, as Saint Paul says: "Let no one deceive himself. If anyone among you thinks that he is wise in this age, let him become a fool that he may become wise. For the wisdom of this world is folly with God" (1 Corinthians 3:18-19). Our wisdom is found in the paradox of Christ on the Cross: His death appeared foolish, it appeared irrelevant, but in reality, it was the most important historical event that has ever happened. It ushered in the new Creation, bringing about the Resurrection of all. His death and resurrection, indeed, are the vivid manifestation of God's still small voice: by appearances small and despised, but in reality, Truth and Life-giving.

So, let us follow the Divine command, and "be still, and know that I Am God" (Psalm 45/46:10). And by our living as still and small men and women of prayer in the midst of the tumults of the world, our great and mighty Lord will paradoxically be manifested to the world through us.

May the Holy Prophet Elijah intercede for us so that we might all humbly transmit the still small voice of our almighty, all-powerful, and all-loving God so that the world might come to know He Who Is.

Philippians 3:7-14 (Epistle, Saint)

But what things were gain to me, these I have counted loss for Christ. Yet indeed I also count all things loss for the excellence of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord, for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them as rubbish, that I may gain Christ and be found in Him, not having my own righteousness, which is from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ, the righteousness which is from God by faith; that I may know Him and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His sufferings, being conformed to His death, if, by any means, I may attain to the resurrection from the dead. Not that I have already attained, or am already perfected; but I press on, that I may lay hold of that for which Christ Jesus has also laid hold of me. Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended; but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead, I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.

Venerable Moses the Hungarian of the Kiev Near Caves

Commemorated on [July 26](#)

Saint Moses the Hungarian of the Caves, was a brother of Saint Ephraim of Novy Torg (January 28), and of Saint George. Together with them he entered into the service of the holy Prince Boris (July 24). After the murder of Saint Boris in 1015 at the River Alta (Saint George also perished with him), Saint Moses fled and hid himself at Kiev with Predislava, sister of prince Yaroslav. In 1018, when the Polish king Boleslav seized Kiev, Saint Moses and his companions wound up in Poland as captives.

Tall and handsome, Saint Moses attracted the attention of a certain rich Polish widow, who burned with a passionate desire for him and wanted to ransom him from captivity and make him her husband. Saint Moses resolutely refused to exchange captivity for slavery to a wife. Despite his refusal, the Polish woman bought the captive.

She did everything in her power to seduce the youth, but he preferred hunger pains to banquets of food. Then the Polish woman began to convey Saint Moses through her lands, thinking to captivate him by power and riches. Saint Moses told her that he would not trade spiritual riches for the perishable things of this world, and that he wished to become a monk.

Passing through the area, an Athonite hieromonk tonsured Saint Moses a monk. The Polish woman gave orders

Activities for Families During the Pandemic

Here are some things families can think about doing in addition to any spiritual activities you are following at home during this time. Some of what is written seems to apply to times when stay at home orders were in place. However the suggestions are still relevant. The Lord's blessing be upon you. +Paul

As schools and workplaces transition to online operations, many families with children have found themselves at home juggling schoolwork, parental duties and little bodies that never seem to stop moving.

Museums, arcades, jump parks and other family friendly locations are also closed. But, with a little planning and creativity the whole family can thrive during an extended period of social distancing and self-quarantine.

Create a routine for work and play

The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends maintaining a schedule to provide structure to the day. Routines help keep life organized and limit chaos, especially in times of transition.

“The whole family can benefit from a predictable routine. Routine tells the brain what’s coming and helps children and adults mentally and physically prepare for the next event. It provides a sense of predictability that can reduce stress and anxiety,” says [Laura E. McAleer-Leavey, M.D.](#), a family medicine physician at Riverside Primary Care Kiln Creek.

A routine should include time for educational and physical activities as well as general time frames for meals, cleanup, personal hygiene and rest. Here’s a sample schedule you could adapt for your family:

DAILY SCHEDULE

8-9 Breakfast, clean room, get dressed, brush teeth

9-10 School work

10-11:30 Physical activity/outdoor play

11:30-12:30 Lunch and cleanup

12:30-2:30 Nap, quiet time, reading (MOM/DAD WORK)

2:30 -3:30 Electronic educational activities

3:30-4:30 Physical activity/outdoor play

4:30-5 Cook and household cleanup

5-6 Dinner

6-7 Bath/shower, pajamas, clean rooms, brush teeth

7-8 Reading, TV, puzzles, family games

Activities you can do during quarantine

At home and outside, there are many activities that can keep the family active and learning. An extended period at home or in social isolation can serve as an opportunity to learn new skills like roller skating or cooking. Trying new things keeps the mind active and will help everyone in the house avoid boredom.

Physical activities

Exercise and physical activity provide both mental and physical health benefits. Don’t put your well-being on hold just because your favorite gym or activity center is closed. Enjoy activities that get the whole family moving.

- Go for a walk or bike ride in the neighborhood
- Play classic movement games such as duck, duck, goose, hide-and-seek and follow-the-leader
- Stream family friendly workouts
- Take a hike in a local park
- Roller-skate or roller-blade
- Go on a scavenger hunt (inside or out)
- Play freeze dance to everyone’s favorite music

Keep the house tidy with the cleanup game; set a timer and assign everyone a room to speed clean

Educational activities

Take this rare opportunity to learn about places around the world, flex your board game muscle and visit famous landmarks, all from the comfort of your own home.

- Take a virtual field trip to regional and international zoos, museums and aquariums
- Visit famous landmarks and interesting regions around the world through books and websites
- Learn about healthy eating and test out new recipes
- Put together age-appropriate puzzles
