Premiere Concert Performance for Archdiocesan Choir of Washington, D.C.

The Archdiocesan Choir of Washington, D.C. gave its premiere concert on Sunday, August 28 at Saint Nicholas Orthodox Cathedral. The group was formed earlier this year with the blessing and support of His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon. Led by Juliana Woodill, the choir sang works from Great Vespers and Divine Liturgy written entirely by American Orthodox composers for the English language. This project began with a call for compositions in February and over one hundred pieces were received for consideration. In selecting music, singability for the average church choir was of primary importance, keeping in mind the need for simplicity, beauty, and flexible voicings. Secondly, the hope was to share music that is both uniquely American and liturgically appropriate.

Bishop Daniel Celebrates Patronal Feast of Cleveland Cathedral

The historic cathedral in Cleveland, St. Theodosius Cathedral, celebrated the feast of their heavenly patron, St. Theodosius, Wonderworker of Chernigov this past weekend, Friday, September 9, through Sunday, September 11. This important feast for the cathedral community was marked by the archpastoral visit of His Grace Bishop Daniel of Chicago and the Midwest.

Divine Liturgy was held on Friday, September 9, the translation of the relics of St. Theodosius, and was led by the Cathedral Dean, Priest Ján Čižmár, and concelebrating with him was Priest Alexander Koranda, Dean of Holy Trinity Cathedral. Fr. Ján offered a reflection on the life of St. Theodosius after the liturgy highlighting the saint's attention to the good order of the divine services. He reminded those gathered of the importance of this being at the center of community life above all else.

Great Vespers were held Saturday evening where His Grace was welcomed, commemorating his first visit as Diocesan Hierarch to the cathedral, and Cleveland.

On Sunday morning Bishop Daniel entered the cathedral and was greeted by the clergy and the faithful. Serving with the Bishop of Chicago were Priest Ján Čižmár, Archpriest Basil Stoyka, Archpriest John Adamcio, Archpriest Alexander Garklavs, Archpriest John Zdinak, Priest Alexander Koranda, and Protodeacon Samuel Slimak. The homily was offered by Bishop Daniel.

At the Little Entrance, Fr. Ján received the nabadrennik, and kamilavka as Diocesan Awards, and awarded the Gold Cross on behalf of the Synod of the Orthodox Church in America. Upon bestowing these priestly awards, the Bishop expressed his gratitude for Fr. Ján's work, but also mentioned that these awards are in anticipation for the continued good work and labors that will be accomplished.

During the divine services, Bishop Daniel remembered those who lost their life in the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001.

At the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy, His Grace greeted the cathedral community congratulating them on their parish feast and recalled visiting the parish as

a priest, and his excitement to now serve the community as their hierarch. Fr. Ján welcomed His Grace, and all were invited to a festive meal in the parish hall.

Feast of the Cross Celebrated by Bishop Daniel of Chicago

On Wednesday, September 14, the Great Feast of the Elevation of the Life-giving Cross, His Grace Bishop Daniel of Chicago and the Diocese of the Midwest served the festal services at his Diocesan Cathedral, Holy Trinity Cathedral.

On Tuesday, September 13, Bishop Daniel celebrated the All Night Vigil for the feast of the Cross and preformed the Rite of Elevation. The next day, His Grace celebrated Divine Liturgy and was joined by Priest Alexander Koranda, Cathedral Dean, Protodeacon Thomas Keith, and Deacon Paul Garklavs.

His Grace offered a homily on the Holy Cross, in which the faithful venerated following the sermon.

Metropolitan Tikhon represented at the enthronement of His Eminence Metropolitan Nicholas

On Sunday, September 18, 2022, Archpriest Alexander Rentel, Chancellor of the Orthodox Church in America, represented His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon at the celebration of the Divine Liturgy and enthronement of His Eminence Metropolitan Nicholas of Manhattan, newly elected First Hierarch of the Russian Orthodox Church Outside of Russia. At the banquet following the Divine Liturgy, Father Alexander read a letter of greeting from Metropolitan Tikhon to Metropolitan Nicholas, and presented Metropolitan Nicholas with a gift from His Beatitude. Luke 5:1-11 (Gospel)

So it was, as the multitude pressed about Him to hear the word of God, that He stood by the Lake of Gennesaret, and saw two boats standing by the lake; but the fishermen had gone from them and were washing their nets. Then He got into one of the boats, which was Simon's, and asked him to put out a little from the land. And He sat down and taught the multitudes from the boat. When He had stopped speaking, He said to Simon, "Launch out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch." But Simon answered and said to Him, "Master, we have toiled all night and caught nothing; nevertheless at Your word I will let down the net." And when they had done this, they caught a great number of fish, and their net was breaking. So they signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink. When Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord!" For he and all who were with him were astonished at the catch of fish which they had taken; and so also were James and John, the sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Bishop Daniel Meets with Seminarians

On Friday, September 16, His Grace Bishop Daniel of Chicago and the Diocese of the Midwest met with the diocesan seminarians from St. Tikhon Orthodox Theological Seminary, South Canaan, PA. His Grace was at the monastery for the funeral services of Metropolitan Herman (Swaiko), of blessed memory.

During the informal meeting, Bishop Daniel was able to discuss a number of topics with his seminarians about their current life at seminary, as well as life within the diocese. The seminarians also had a chance to ask questions and share their experiences of seminary with the Bishop.

The seminarians also noted their excitement for the upcoming enthronement taking place in Chicago on September 30 and October 1. His Grace invited the theological students to be a part of this important moment in the life of the diocese.

As previously announced, September is "Support Our Seminarians" month within the diocese. This annual appeal focuses on directly helping the seminarians and their families who are studying to serve the Church.

Before departing to Chicago, Bishop Daniel offered prayers before the graves of former hierarchs of the Midwest, including, Metropolitan Leonty (Turkevich), and Archbishop John (Garklavs).

Detroit Ministry Seeking Assistance to Continue Good Work

The community of St. Peter and St. Paul Cathedral, Detroit, MI, launch a campaign seeking assistance to upgrade their community center which serves weekly meals to those in need. The present center lacks a functioning kitchen which many local residents rely on to serve them meals.

For the past ten years, the cathedral community has focused on local service ministry assisting those in southwest Detroit a warm meal every Sunday afternoon. During this time many surrounding church communities and organizations have joined the effort by preparing food and serving on Sundays.

Other ministries hosted at the community center include Orthodox Detroit Outreach weekly food distribution, St. Maria Food Pantry and Clothing Closet, St. Herman Children's Ministries, St. Elizabeth End-of-life Ministries, and an enquirer's Study/Library.

"We hope you will help us to further this work with your generosity and prayers," said, Archpriest Paul Albert, Rector of St. Peter and St. Paul Cathedral. "Over the past ten years we have been blessed to host our brothers and sisters from parishes throughout the Midwest who have come to work and serve in our setting. We thank you all for helping sustain our Orthodox Christian presence here in the inner city of Detroit."

"We now make an appeal for your help with the renovation of our new kitchen. As the center of any community, a functioning kitchen is essential to our continued missionary efforts in the inner-city. The new kitchen will serve as the heart of our missionary center, providing a place to prepare food for our various ministries and neighborhood gatherings, serving the men, women, and children of our beloved community of southwest Detroit."

The project has been in the works for over a year, but unexpected increases in costs have slowed the process down. The goal is to raise \$50,000.00 towards the purchase of exhaust system and cooking appliances still needed to complete the project.

"The funds we raise through this appeal will go directly to our kitchen renovation project. We ask that you take a moment to help us, thinking about the positive impacts your contribution can make on the lives of so many other people."

Bishop Daniel attends Funeral of Metropolitan Herman

Funeral services were held at St. Tikhon of Zadonsk Monastery in South Canaan, PA, for His Beatitude Metropolitan Herman (Swaiko), who reposed on September 6, 2022. Metropolitan Herman served as the Primate of the Orthodox Church in America from 2002 to 2008.

The funeral services for the late Primate were on Thursday, September 15 and Friday, September 16. His Grace Bishop Daniel of Chicago and the Diocese of the Midwest concelebrated with His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon, Archbishop of Washington, Metropolitan of All American and Canada, His Eminence Archbishop Benjamin of San Francisco and the Diocese of the West, His Eminence Archbishop Michael of New York and the Diocese of New York and New Jersey, and His Grace Bishop Alexei of Sitka and the Diocese of Alaska.

A number of clergy from the Diocese of the Midwest were also present, including; Archpriest Andrew Nelko, Archpriest Alexander Garklavs, Archpriest Nicholas Wyslutsky, Archpriest Eilian Hutnyan, Archpriest Andrew Bartek, and Priest Alexander Koranda.

Bishop Daniel offered the eulogy at Divine Liturgy focusing on the Metropolitan's many years of service to the Church.

Metropolitan Herman was laid to rest at St. Tikhon of Zadonsk Monastery, where he lived for most of his earthly life.

His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon Offers Condolences for the Repose of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

On September 8, 2022 His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon sent a letter of condolence to His Majesty King Charles III on the occasion of the repose of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the longest reigning British monarch and the head of state of the United Kingdom, Canada, and many Commonwealth countries around the world.

The text of the letter reads as follows:

Your Majesty:

I write to express my condolences on the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Your mother's long reign as Queen of the United Kingdom, Canada, and the other Commonwealth realms was one marked by many changes, and throughout all of them, she maintained and cultivated the esteem not only of her subjects, but of all the peoples of the Anglophone world and beyond. She was, for many, the only monarch of the United Kingdom and Canada in their lifetime, and doubtless, she will be remembered for many years longer.

Remarks for Beginning of the School Year at Saint Vladimir's Seminary

I would like briefly to address the seminarians as they begin their new academic year.

Today, as we exalt the most precious and life-giving Cross, we see an instrument of torture and death that has been transformed, by the power of Christ's Passion and Resurrection, into a instrument of victory over death, the world, and the devil. Through Christ's Pascha, the Cross has become our greatest weapon against temptation, sin, and spiritual death.

We are surrounded by temptations to conform ourselves to the ways of the world and to substitute the life in Christ for the spiritual death of sin. Some of these temptations are obvious, and some are less so.

On the one hand, we are called to conform the practices and rhythms of our lives to the feasts and fasts of the Christian year, not to the pleasures and sorrows of this passing world. We are called to receive and teach the holy doctrines of the apostles and the fathers, not the novelties and perversions of this age. And we are called to live according to those teachings, not according to our own appetites and desires and notions.

And yet we are also called to avoid vainglory, pride, anger, and judgment. Our fasts and our feasts will not please the Lord if we do them for display—whether that display is directed towards our physical communities or our online social networks. Our faithfulness to the doctrines of the Church is of no avail if we angrily dispute with our neighbors or with acquaintances and strangers on social media. Our efforts to live a moral, virtuous life mean nothing if our mind is filled with anger and judgment against others.

As Christians, we are called to a life of perfect action and perfect contemplation. We must be active in studying and teaching the truth, in the preaching and practice of virtue. But we must also remain at all times recollected in God, asking him for his aid, and offering up all our efforts to him. We must remember that all of our efforts are nothing but steps toward the knowledge of God, the love of the Lord, and everlasting union with him, a possibility which has been opened unto us by the great work of Jesus

Christ, our true God and only Savior.

As a new academic year begins, you are embarking upon a season of especially intense study and formation. I pray that, during this time, you will keep the Lord at the center of your efforts, avoid unprofitable distractions and habits, and focus all your words, deeds, and thoughts on the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ, the good news of our salvation.

May you always fix your gaze on the image of the Cross and sign yourselves with that holy sign, reminding yourselves of the crucified Lord whom you serve and the cruciform shape of your service. May the Cross of Christ be your strength, your joy, and your salvation amid all the challenges, inner and outer, that face you during your time at seminary and throughout the days of your life.

With that, I wish you all a joyous feast of the Cross. I pray that the Lord will make this academic year fruitful for you all.

While the choir is a project of the Orthodox Church in America, it includes singers from area parishes of many other jurisdictions as well, bringing together those who share a common faith and are separated only administratively. The Archdiocesan Choir is not a professional or auditioned ensemble and does not require a particular level of musical education or even the ability to read music. It is a group of Orthodox Christians desiring to sing praises to God, to learn, and to grow. The choir's primary purpose will be liturgical, singing for various services and events in the Archdiocese and for His Beatitude. In the future, the choir hopes to facilitate events for community and fellowship as well as educational opportunities for Orthodox singers in the National Capital Region.

In his remarks at the conclusion of the concert, His Beatitude summed up the evening and the importance of liturgical music:

“What we have experienced this evening is not simply a concert but rather an immersion in the sacred liturgical life of the Orthodox Church. It is an experience that elicits something deeper than the merely aesthetical or emotional response of worldly entertainment. Rather, it is an experience that introduces us into the very life of God. These sacred offerings both lift us up, in all our human brokenness and suffering, to the edges of the heavenly and life-giving kingdom and draw down the light of that kingdom to illumine our world of darkness, war, and isolation. Our liturgical hymns and our sacred worship do not provide escapes for us but rather provide a conduit for the grace of God to fill and strengthen our hearts, whether they be joyful or suffering, and bind us together in one of the few ways that human beings can be truly united: communion with Christ through sacred worship.”

It was announced at the 20th All-American Council of the Orthodox Church in America in Baltimore, MD that the first Sunday after the feast of Saint Romanus the Melodist (October 1) would be designated Musician Sunday. This day recognizes the vital ministry of our choirs in the life of the Church and honors those who serve as musicians in our parishes. His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon reminds us in his Encyclical from 2018 that “Music is often the first thing which deeply strikes people when they walk into an Orthodox church, even before they absorb the iconography, the architecture, the words of the services, or the preaching.” Often, our congregations see only the product of the work of the choir and *Con't Pg 13*
